## OUTCOMES OF THE 8<sup>TH</sup> ASIA/OCEANIA REGION INTERGOVERNMENTAL MINISTERIAL MEETING ON ANTI-DOPING IN SPORT



**The 8th Asia/Oceania Region Intergovernmental Ministerial Meeting on Anti-Doping in Sport was held on 21-22 May 2011 in Riyadh, Saudi Arabia and 23 countries participated.**

On the first day, several key topics were covered as follows:

#### a) WADA Contributions for the Asia Region

The Finance Committee reported the outcomes of its discussion and examination at the meeting in September 2010 and presented recommendations on the future contribution funding formula for the region. Following feedback from the meeting participants, an Ad-Hoc Committee was set up (Brunei, Darussalam, China, Japan and Qatar) to make recommendations on the 2012 contribution formula, which was adopted by the meeting participants.

The 2013 contributions and beyond will be further discussed by the Ad-Hoc Committee through the year and a recommendation will be presented to the next Asia/Oceania Region Intergovernmental Ministerial Meeting in 2012.

#### b) WADA Foundation Board Member Election for Asia

The membership term for China and Jordan is due to expire on 31 December 2011 and as in past years an election needs to be held. It was agreed that the election process will be overseen by WADA and undertaken by the Asia/Oceania Regional Office. The eligibility of candidates (which requires full payment to WADA and ratification of the UNESCO Convention) and the voting process remain unchanged.

It was recommended to go through the

consultation process with all Asian governments so that the final votes will be either disclosed or closed. The inquiry will be sent out from the WADA Asia/Oceania Regional Office shortly, and it will be determined before the voting process begins in September.

#### c) Ratification of the UNESCO International Convention against Doping in Sport (Convention) and the UNESCO Voluntary Fund.

An update on the status of the Convention and information on the UNESCO Voluntary Fund and its application process were presented by UNESCO. All Asian governments were encouraged to ratify, accept, accede or sign the Convention as soon as possible.

#### d) Future Meeting

Iran and Pakistan kindly offered to host the next meeting in 2012. In the coming months, the WADA Asia/Oceania Regional Office will coordinate with potential host countries on the details, including the dates and venue. Details of the meeting will be released later this year once they are available, so participants can make arrangements.

All presentation documents, background papers and the meeting resolution are available from the WADA Regional Office upon request.

## CODE COMPLIANCE

### Urgent to be Code Compliant by November 2011.

WADA's report on Anti-Doping Organizations' (ADOs) Code compliance status will be officially published in November 2011. Being declared non-compliant could have consequences for an ADO, such as being ineligible to bid for an event in your country, or the cancellation of events.

According to the Code, WADA must report on ADOs compliance every two years. The next reporting deadline for the last interim compliance report is in September 2011, and then in November 2011 for the final compliance report. WADA is committed to working with each ADO to reach compliance. There is not a lot of time left and we strongly urge ADOs to make this their top priority.

To be compliant there are a few steps to be taken:

#### 1. **WADA needs to declare the ADO's anti-doping rules are in line with the Code**

So far the majority of countries have submitted their rules for review and have been acknowledged to be in line with the Code.

Those yet to do this are Cambodia, Vietnam, Yemen, Kiribati and Solomon Islands.

Please send your rules to WADA for review. Draft rules have been designed especially so that ADOs can use these as a guide.

#### 2. **Complete the WADA on-line Compliance Survey**

Once your rules are declared to be in line by WADA, you then need to report on your country's anti-doping programs.. The report can be completed simply by filling out the on-line Compliance Survey. (NB: if you have not yet completed the review process of your anti-doping rules, you will be unable to complete the survey). Please login at: <http://codecompliancesurvey.wada-ama.org/login.php>

Then select the name of your organization from the drop-down list and enter the initial password **247s68**. You can then create your own password and complete the survey.

Those who have yet to complete the survey are;

Asia - Afghanistan, Bangladesh, *Cambodia\**, DPR Korea, Iraq, Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan, Laos, Lebanon, Mongolia, Nepal, Oman, Pakistan, Palestine, Syria, Tajikistan, Timor-Leste, Turkmenistan, Uzbekistan, Yemen.

Oceania - Guam, *Kiribati\**, *Solomon Islands\** and Tuvalu.

*\*The survey can only be answered once you complete the anti-doping rules review.*

### 3. **Anti-Doping Program**

This means the ADO undertakes anti-doping activities on a daily basis, in some key identified areas:

- Have **Therapeutic Use Exemptions** (Article 4.4 of the Code) in place and a robust system for your athletes to apply for TUE's;
- Carry out **In- and out-of-competition testing programs** (Article 5 of the Code) according to the International Standard for Testing;
- Have a **Results management process** (Article 7 of the Code) in place with the appropriate committees, including appeals;
- Have **Education programs** (Article 18 of the Code) in place for athletes and other individuals involved in sport, which focus on anti-doping prevention. Specific anti-doping topics which should be covered are outlined in Article 18.

Following your report of your anti-doping programs on the online survey (and also from your report at the RADO meeting for RADO member countries), your anti-doping programs are assessed on the above required areas.

Those who are not fully compliant are:

Asia - Afghanistan, Bahrain, Bangladesh, Bhutan, Cambodia, DPR Korea, India, Iraq, Kyrgyzstan, Laos, Lebanon, Maldives, Myanmar, Nepal, Palestine, Sri Lanka, Syria, Tajikistan, Timor-Leste, Turkmenistan, United Arab Emirates, Uzbekistan, Vietnam, Yemen.

Oceania – American Samoa, Cook Islands, Guam, Kiribati, Marshall Islands, Micronesia, Nauru, Palau, Papua New Guinea, Samoa, Solomon Islands, Tonga, Tuvalu and Vanuatu.

WADA is ready to assist stakeholders in the Code compliance process. Please contact us for your current Code compliance status.

1. **Model Anti-Doping Rules** – Model rules for NADOs/NOCs acting as a NADO have been developed for your use. Customized model rules are available upon request.
2. **Code Compliance Survey** – Should you have any queries or need assistance in completing the survey, please do not hesitate to contact us.
3. **Anti-Doping Programs** – WADA provides support through the RADO so that all member countries can implement the required anti-doping programs in the respective countries.

## 2010 Anti-Doping Organizations' Statistics

Section 14.4 of the Code states that "Anti-Doping Organizations shall, at least annually, publish publicly a general statistical report of their Doping Control activities with a copy provided to WADA".

Section 14.5 further states that "WADA shall act as the central clearing house for Doping Control Testing data" from anti-doping organizations and "shall, at least annually, publish statistical reports summarizing such information".

If your NADO has not already done so, please provide a statistical report to WADA.

Should your 2010 anti-doping data already be entered in the Anti-Doping Administration and Management System (ADAMS), we thank you for your cooperation. Alternatively, please advise WADA where your statistics can be found (Web site, Annual Report, etc) or complete the template report (available upon request) prepared to assist your organization in meeting the requirements of Code Article 14.4.

WADA will subsequently publish these statistics in full or in part to meet our responsibility as outlined in Code Article 14.5.

Please note that these statistics are distinct from those submitted by WADA accredited laboratories and therefore any discrepancies should be resolved between the relevant laboratories and testing authorities. WADA is currently reviewing ways to improve the consistency of these two sets of figures in an effort to provide stakeholders with a more comprehensive view of global anti-doping activity. These possible changes will be communicated to you once finalized.

## UNESCO International Convention against Doping in Sport

As of 24 August 2011, 159 countries have ratified the Convention. In our region, Kyrgyzstan, Sri Lanka and Uzbekistan have recently become a State Party to the Convention. Only 34 countries are yet to ratify the Convention, including nine Asian countries and five Oceania countries. State Parties are encouraged to apply for UNESCO's Voluntary Fund to help the progress of anti-doping programs.

## CONTRIBUTION

As of 24 August 2011, 22 Asian countries have paid their 2011 contribution, bringing the total received to 91.5% of Asian contributions. Oceania has completed the contribution 2011.

## RADO UPDATE

### RADOCA

The Central Asia RADO Board members convened on 4-5 April 2011 in Tashkent, Uzbekistan to discuss further development of its anti-doping programs. Iran had decided to become an observer for the RADO. The member countries are now, Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan, Mongolia, Pakistan, Tajikistan, Turkmenistan and Uzbekistan. Uzbekistan offered to host the administrative office for the RADOCA region. The TUE and Result Management training workshops were conducted in cooperation with UK Anti-Doping (UKAD).

### Oceania

The Oceania RADO Board members convened on 3-4 May 2011 in Apia, Samoa. All countries have been making progress in their activities and they welcomed Palau to become the 7<sup>th</sup> ORADO member. The ORADO will be managing the testing program at the Pacific Games in New Caledonia.

### GCCY RADO

The Gulf States and Yemen RADO Board members convened on 8 May 2011 in Kuwait City to discuss further development of its anti-doping programs. At the same time, the Result Management training workshop was conducted in cooperation with UK Anti-Doping (UKAD).

### SEA RADO

Southeast Asia RADO Board members convened on 8 June 2011 in Jakarta, Indonesia. The SEA RADO office is going to be moved from Thailand to Singapore in coming months. The SEA RADO is ready to support Indonesia with its hosting of the SEA Games in November. DCO training was also conducted in cooperation with UKAD and the Finnish Antidoping Agency (FINADA). WADA also provided an ADAMS training session for SEA RADO member countries.

### WAADO

The West Asia RADO Board members convened on 16-17 June 2011 in Amman, Jordan. All board members agreed to work on their anti-doping program implementation. TUE and Result Management training sessions were also conducted in cooperation with UKAD.

### SA RADO

The South Asia Board meeting and training workshops are scheduled for 8-10 September 2011 in the Maldives.
